Cantor's Notes

Hanukkah is quickly approaching. The first candle will be lit Saturday night, December 24th. Julie Wiener, managing editor of My Jewish Learning, posted 9 things about Hanukkah that some of us may or may not be aware of. Some of them I knew, and some I didn't. How many do you know?

1. Gelt as we know it is a relatively new tradition — and no one knows who invented it.

While coins – "gelt" is Yiddish for coins, or money – have been part of Hanukkah observance for centuries, chocolate gelt is considerably younger. In her book On the Chocolate Trail, Rabbi Deborah Prinz writes that "opinions differ" concerning the origins of chocolate gelt. Some credit America's Loft Candy Company with creating it in the 1920s, while others suggest there were European versions earlier that inspired Israel's Elite Candy Company. Prinz notes, as well, that chocolate gelt resembles a European Christmas tradition of exchanging gold-covered chocolate coins "commemorating the miracles of St. Nicholas."

2. The first Hanukkah celebration was actually a delayed Sukkot observance.

The second book of Maccabees quotes from a letter sent circa 125 BCE from the Hasmoneans (the Macabees' descendants) to the leaders of Egyptian Jewry, describing the holiday as "the festival of Sukkot celebrated in the month of Kislev rather than Tishrei." Since the Jews were still in caves fighting as guerrillas on Tishrei, 164 BCE, they had been unable to honor the eight-day holiday of Sukkot, which required visiting the Jerusalem Temple; hence it was postponed until after the recapture of Jerusalem and the rededication of the Temple. Many scholars believe it is this – and not the Talmudic legend of the cruse of oil that lasted eight days – explains why Hanukkah is eight days long.

3. The books of Maccabees, which tell the story of Hanukkah, aren't included in the Hebrew Bible – but they are in the Catholic Bible.

Kosher Fusion by Shuli



Roasted Red Pepper Dip (Muhummara)

AKA that spicy red dip from Rosh Hashanah Adapted by Brittni Coe from a recipe by Aarti Sequiera



Ingredients:

1 jar roasted red peppers + 2 tbsp of juice (look for a jar that has lots of charred bits, this is where the flavor is)

OR

- 2 Medium Red Bell Peppers
- 4 1/2 gloves Minced Garlic
- 4 1/2 tbsp. pomegranate molasses (this can be found in the international aisle of most supermarkets, or you can make your own)
- 2 tsp ground cumin
- 4 tsp Smoked Spanish paprika (or to taste)
- 3 tsp red pepper flakes (or to taste)
- 4 tbsp. extra virgin olive oil

Optional: 1 ½ C raw walnut halves and pieces

Step 1: If using fresh bell peppers follow steps below, if not skip ahead to step 2 Preheat the oven to 350 degrees F. Roast the red peppers. Place each bell pepper over the open flame of a gas burner or grill, cooking until the skin blackens and blisters. Rotate the peppers and blacken all the way around, about 15 minutes. Alternatively, you can roast the peppers in the oven by placing the bell peppers on a baking sheet and placing under the broiler, turning frequently, until the peppers are blackened and blistered all over. Put the blackened peppers in a bowl, cover with plastic wrap, and set aside to steam. Peel the red peppers using a paring knife. Discard the peels, stem and seeds. You won't always get all of the seeds but that's ok because they will be ground up by the food processor.

Step 2: Throw the roasted red peppers, walnuts, garlic, paprika, cumin,

red pepper flakes, lemon juice, pomegranate molasses and olive oil into a food processor with a teaspoon of salt, and run until the dip is smooth. Season again for taste, cool and serve.

For optional crunch spread walnuts on parchment lined baking sheet and pop into the oven after the peppers, until light golden in color and aromatic. This takes between 10-15 minutes. Remove from the oven and cool completely before adding the walnuts to the food processor.

Pomegranate Molasses

You'll pay upwards of \$7 to buy this stuff in the store, why do that when you can make your own - and in larger quantities for basically the same price? Most of us have these ingredients already on hand.

Ingredients:

4 C pomegranate juice ½ C white sugar 1 Tbsp. lemon juice

For Molasses: Place the pomegranate juice, sugar and lemon juice in a 4quart saucepan set over medium heat. Cook, stirring occasionally, until the sugar has completely dissolved. Once the sugar has dissolved, reduce the heat to mediumlow and cook until the mixture has reduced to 1 cup, approximately 70 minutes. It should be the consistency of thick syrup. Remove from the heat and allow to cool in the saucepan for 30 minutes. Transfer to a glass jar and allow to cool completely before covering and storing in the refrigerator for up to 6 months.

converted to Judaism before marrying Jewish playwright Arthur Miller, her future mother-in-law gave her a menorah as a conversion gift. The Hanukkah lamp, which the menorah's current owner says Mrs. Miller brought back from Jerusalem, has a wind-up music box in its base that plays Hatikvah, Israel's national anthem. It's featured in the Jewish Museum in New York City's exhibit "Becoming Jewish: Warhol's Liz and Marilyn," but sadly you can't wind it up. 5. The game of dreidel was inspired by a German game played at Christmas time, which is itself an imitation of an English and Irish one.

Our Eastern European game of dreidel (including the letters nun, gimmel, hey, shin) is directly based on the German equivalent of the British totum game: N = Nichts = nothing; G = Ganz = all; H = Halb = half; and S = Stell ein = put in. In German, the spinning top was called a "torrel" or "trudl."

6. Oily food (think latkes and sufganiyot) isn't Hanukkah's only culinary tradition.

Traditionally, Hanukkah has included foods with cheese in recognition of Judith, whose liberal use of the salty treat facilitated a victory for the Maccabees.

7. On Hanukkah, we celebrate a grisly murder.

The aforementioned Judith had an ulterior motive for plving Assyrian general Holofernes with salty cheese:

Weekly Parshas

<u>Toldot</u> <u>Genesis</u> 25:19 - 28:9

Returning one day from the hunt, a famished Esau traded his birthright (status as a firstborn) to Jacob for a bowl of lentil stew.

Isaac and Rebecca seek relief from famine in Gerar. Isaac presents Rebecca as his sister, just as Abraham had done with Sarah on two previous occasions. This time, however, the truth about their relationship does not lead to expulsion. They are allowed to remain in Gerar and Isaac becomes quite wealthy. His success arouses the enmity of the locals, and their king, Avimelech, requests that they depart.

Esau brings grief to his parents by marrying two Hittite women.

Years later Isaac requests that Esau prepare a special meal for him after which he will confirm his older son's position as first born. Rebecca overhears her husband's conversation, and conspires to disguise Jacob as his older brother. While Isaac has some uncertainty as to whom he is blessing, the ruse works because Isaac has become blind in his old age. Jacob receives a blessing for inheriting a fertile land and ruling over nations.

When Esau returns, the plot is revealed. An enraged Esau vows to kill his brother upon their father's death. Rebecca and Isaac encourage Jacob to leave home and to go to Haran to live with Rebecca's brother, Laban.

In an effort to appease his parents for marrying Hittite women, Esau also married a daughter of Ishmael.

<u>Vayetzei</u> <u>Genesis</u> <u>28:10 - 32:3</u>

On route to his uncle's home in Haran, Jacob encamps in the open air near the city of Luz. That night he has a vision of angels ascending and descending a ladder from heaven. God appears to him and promises protection to Jacob, and the land to his descendants. In the morning Jacob erects a stele on the site, renames the place Beth El, and vows that if he returns home unharmed he will dedicate a tenth of his possessions to God.

On the outskirts of Haran, Jacob encounters his cousin Rachel, a shepherdess, at the local well. He is so taken with her that he single-handedly removes the stone covering the well and waters her flock. Jacob is welcomed cordially into his uncle Laban's household, and he agrees to work for seven years as a shepherd in order to gain his cousin Rachel's hand in marriage. Laban

deceives him and he is wedded to Leah, Rachel's older sister. Jacob must now work an additional seven years to marry Rachel.

During the years in Haran, Leah and Rachel - and their handmaidens, Bilhah and Zilpah – bear Jacob eleven sons and one daughter. (Benjamin, the 12th son, will be born near Bethlehem.)

Jacob works an additional six years for Laban in exchange for all the streaked and spotted animals born into the flock. Without any detriment to Laban's pure black and white animals, Jacob's flock becomes exceedingly numerous, arousing envy and hostility in Laban and his sons. Jacob decides that it is time to return home with his family and flock. He departs while Laban is away; Laban overtakes him and they have a brief confrontation before concluding a covenant of peace with each other. The journey home is resumed.

<u>Vayishlach</u> Genesis 32:4 - 36:43

Jacob prepares for the worst as he anticipates having to confront his brother Esau upon his return home. He divides his household into two groups so that if Esau and his troops set upon one, the other might escape. He also sends a succession of valuable gifts to Esau in the hope of appearing him.

The night before their "reunion" Jacob wrestles with a man (actually an angel) and defeats him. This stranger blesses him with a new name, Israel, the meaning of which is "he who prevails with God".

Jacob's fears regarding his brother turn out to be unfounded. Esau embraces him with affection and offers to escort Jacob's family. Jacob declines the offer; Esau returns to Seir, and Jacob eventually settles in Shechem, a town named by its chieftain, Hamor, in honor of his son.

Jacob's only daughter, Dinah is seduced by Shechem. The only circumstance under which Dinah's brothers will allow them to marry is if all the Shechemite men undergo circumcision. Surprisingly, they agree. While they are recuperating, Simeon and Levi, Dinah's brothers, slay them all to avenge their sister's dishonor.

Jacob departs Shechem, journeying to Beth El, the site of his vision of the heavenly staircase. God's promise to him is reiterated and his name Israel is re-confirmed. Rachel dies near the city of Bethlehem while giving birth to Benjamin. Jacob reunites with his father, Isaac. Isaac dies at the age of 180, and is buried by his

two sons in the Cave of Machpelah.

The sidra ends with a genealogical listing of the descendants of Esau.

<u>Vayeshev</u> Genesis 37:1 - 40:23

Jacob's favorite among his twelve sons is Joseph. The favoritism is so blatant that it causes resentment among the brothers – a resentment that is only exacerbated by Joseph's dreams of grandeur. Joseph gets his comeuppance when his brothers strip him of the multicolored coat given to him by his father, and throw him into a pit. He is subsequently sold by his brothers to Ishmaelites and winds up in servitude in Egypt. The brothers dip Joseph's coat in blood, leading Jacob to believe that Joseph had been killed by a beast.

The narrative of Joseph's life is interrupted by the story of Judah and his sons. Judah's eldest son married Tamar, but this son soon died. In accordance with the custom of levirate marriage, the next son, Onan, was to marry Tamar in order to produce a male heir for his deceased brother. Onan refused to be a party to this, and he too died. Judah fearing that Tamar was the cause of both sons' deaths was reluctant to let his youngest son marry her. Disguising herself as a cultic harlot. Tamar seduced her father-in-law, Judah, and bore twins. Judah admitted his error in not requiring his youngest son to enter in levirate marriage with Tamar.

Back in Egypt, Joseph had become the most trusted and favored servant of Potiphar, one of Pharaoh's officials. Joseph comes to the attention of his mistress; repeatedly rejecting her advances, she exacts revenge by accusing him of attempted rape. Joseph is imprisoned. He wins the favor of his jailer, who gives him a position of responsibility. Joseph correctly interprets the dreams of two of Pharaoh's jailed servants: the baker who will be executed,

making him thirsty so he would drink lots of wine and pass out, enabling her to chop off his head and bring it home with her. The beheading – particularly the fact that a woman carried it out - was said to have frightened Holofernes' troops into fleeing the Maccabees.

8. The largest menorah in the world, according to the Guinness Book of World Records is 32 feet high and weighs 4,000 pounds.

The Shulchan Aruch stipulates that a menorah should be no taller than about 31 feet. Incidentally, Guinness lists at least three other Hanukkah-related records: most dreidels spinning simultaneously for at least 10 seconds (734), most people simultaneously lighting menorahs (834) and largest display of lit menorahs (1,000).

and the butler, who will return to Pharaoh's service. Joseph implores the butler not to forget him upon his release, for he has been imprisoned unfairly.


<u>Miketz</u> Genesis 41:1 - 44:17

Pharaoh dreams of cows being consumed by cows, and sheaves being replaced by sheaves. The dreams leave him puzzled and anxious. He demands to have someone interpret his dreams, but all the royal experts in such matters are at a loss as to what the dreams portend. The wine butler remembers Joseph's ability to interpret dreams from their days in prison together. Pharaoh orders that Joseph be brought into his presence immediately. Joseph explicates dreams: seven years of bounty will be followed by seven years of famine. Pharaoh elevates Joseph to second in command of the whole country with the mandate to prepare for the famine while produce abounds.

During the famine, which extended beyond the borders of Egypt, ten of Joseph's brothers come to Egypt to buy food. Joseph recognized them, but they don't recognize him. Joseph accuses them of being spies and puts them through a series of unpleasant experiences in order to get them to bring his brother Benjamin to Egypt on their next rip to obtain provisions. Despite grave misgivings, Jacob ultimately accedes to his sons' demands to have Benjamin accompany them to Egypt. There Joseph frames Benjamin for stealing his special wine goblet, and has him arrested.
