Cantor's Notes

I found this lovely thought by Rabbi Yechiel Spero in his Inspiration Daily that I would like to share with you this month.

"In parshat "Behalotecha" we read about the menorah. It's interesting because when we light the menorah we don't light THE menorah they lit in the Beit HaMikdash. We, of course, don't have the Beit HaMikdash nor do we have the menorah.

"We have the menorah of Chanukah. When we light the menorah, we don't just light and add a candle every night, one for each night. Rather, we add a candle, the shamesh. The shamesh is the one that has no inherent holiness. It is not forbidden to get pleasure - benefit from the shamesh. The question is, if so, why on most menorahs is the shamesh elevated? Why is it placed higher than the other candles?

"I heard a beautiful thought. The purpose of the shamesh is to light the other candles. When you spend your existence, your purpose making light for others, creating light within others, then you are indeed more elevated and exhaled than the others.

"A lot of times there are people that stand behind the scene. The people that orchestrate everything, yet never have the lime light. The shamesh represents those people.

We all know them. We know them because they are in our schools, shuls, and communities doing the thankless jobs that nobody wants. The man who cleans up the Beit HaMikdash. The people who work in the building long after hours or early before anybody else arrives. The people who do the small things to make sure you are able to light up the world with your ability. The people who on a very personal level do everything to enable you to find the light within.

"Today, we salute those individuals. Here's to you. A special yasher koach for everything you do. You know who you

Kosher Fusion

Due to unfortunate events I will not be able to write this month's recipe therefore I invited a dear friend and great cook to take over. Please welcome Brittini Coe.

Hello all, the first official day of summer is now behind us, and the future doesn't seem to hold many days below 90 degrees. Despite the heat, the start of summer means that we'll be spending a lot of time in pools and backyard gatherings with friends and family. After a day of fun in the sun, or a hot, traffic filled commute home the last thing anyone wants is to do is heat up the house cooking a meal. June and July really hit me hard with the "it's too hot to cook" mentality. Now, before you start beating yourself up for being a lazy summer chef, remember that it's not you, it's the weather. On hot, humid days the body increases blood flow near the skin to help disperse heat and cool the body down. This means that less blood is directed to muscles which can cause lethargy. In other words, summer will wilt you like an old piece of lettuce. That means that it's time to reach for recipes that don't require a lot of oven time, or effort. This month's recipes are easy to prepare, travel well, and best of all feature ingredients that work *with* the body to cool it from the inside out.

Avocado Caprese Salad

Ingredients

- 2 cups fresh arugula
- 2-3 campari or cocktail style tomatoes, sliced
- ½ avocado, pitted and sliced
- 3 slices fresh mozzarella cheese
- fresh basil leaves
- 1 tablespoon extra virgin olive oil
- 1½ teaspoons balsamic vinegar
- generous pinch of sugar or dollop of honey
- kosher salt and freshly ground black pepper

Instructions

Assemble the arugula, tomato, avocado slices and mozzarella in a serving bowl. Top with torn or slivered basil leaves. Whisk the extra virgin olive oil in a small bowl with the balsamic vinegar, sugar or honey and season with kosher salt and freshly ground black pepper to taste and pour over the salad. Toss to coat and serve.

The tomatoes are water-rich and help hydrate cells resulting in lower body temperature, green leafy vegetables like the arugula contain calcium which works as a thermoregulator, helping the body send signals to the brain to efficiently regulate temperature. Honey has been proven to speed up their recovery time and energy. It was even eaten by ancient

Greeks after Olympic competition. The balsamic vinegar is an astringent, which when consumed causes the body's tissues to retract and increase the absorption of water into cells. Happily hydrated cells equal a happy cool you.



Lemonana (Middle Eastern Frozen Mint lemonade)

Keeping with the beat the heat theme, this drink features citrus which is the most cooling of all fruits as well as a superfood. They contain antioxidants, and vitamin C which can fight free radicals that attack cells, which can help fight damage from the sun and keep you looking younger. Mint is amazingly cooling, and even just a whiff of it can banish the summer sluggishness. Mint also has a long history of use by herbalists who have used it to relieve indigestion and inflammation which can plague the body as the heat makes our systems work overtime.

- Prep time: 5 mins
- Cook time: 3 mins
- Total time: 8 mins
- Yield: 2 servings

Ingredients

- 6 tablespoons sugar
- ½ cup plus 6 tablespoons water, divided
- ½ cup fresh lemon juice
- 4 stems worth of mint leaves (about 40 leaves) with the stems discarded, plus a few extra sprigs for garnish if desired
- 18-20 ice cubes

Instructions

- Add the sugar and 6 tablespoons of water to a small saucepan; heat over medium heat, stirring constantly, until the sugar is dissolved. Cool to room temperature.
 - Add the cooled sugar syrup, remaining ½ cup water, lemon juice, mint leaves, ice cubes, and orange blossom water (if using) to a blender. Pulse a few times to break up the ice and then process until slushy.
 - Pour into 2 tall glasses, garnish with mint leaves if desired, and serve immediately.
- Middle Eastern countries and Southerner's alike know that, when heat rises cooling drinks are a necessity. This drink is super simple to

make, and a different take on the classic lemonade that has long been an American summer staple. The drink is slushy and as the ice rises separation is to be expected. Trust me, the flavor will not be affected. It has a green tinge from the mint and looks impressive served in pitchers or high ball glasses. If bringing to a party, you can also substitute the fresh lemon juice for a lemonade concentrate, as the lemon flavor will not water down as quickly if the drink is going to sit for a while, but remember to account for the higher sugar content. There are many ways to personalize the drink to suit your tastes, you can add sparkling soda, or add white liquor like gin or rum for an adults only version.

Hopefully these recipes help you enjoy the summer gatherings and beat the heat!

Weekly Parshas

Sh'lach Numbers 13:1 - 15:41

At God's command Moses, sends twelve spies – one from each tribe – to scout the land of Canaan and to report back on the land's inhabitants, fortifications and agricultural attributes. They return after forty days with evidence of the land's bounty and fertility, and accounts of the might of its population and well-defended cities.

Ten of the spies were pessimistic about the prospects of a successful Israelite conquest, but Caleb's and Joshua's assessment was optimistic and they urged swift military action. The people sided with the majority, and in a panic expressed their desire to return to Egypt under new leadership.

God's fury with the Israelites is aroused for their lack of faith in themselves and in divine assistance with the conquest. Moses intercedes on the people's behalf averting total annihilation, but God instructs Moses to alter course: the Israelites will wander for forty years – one year for each day of the spies' mission – until the present generation dies out. Only Caleb and Joshua are to be spared this fate; they alone among their contemporaries are to witness the conquest of the land. The ten spies, whose pessimism fueled this latest rebellion, are killed by a plague.

The people now repent and attempt to begin the conquest without divine sanction and despite Moses' warning. Their effort leads to disaster and they are routed by the Amalekites and Canaanites.

As a sign of God's ultimate fulfillment of the promise to give the land of Canaan to the Israelites, the very next passage begins with the phrase "When you come into the Land." This passage contains a variety of laws, most notably challah – the setting apart of a portion of dough for the priest.

The sidra concludes with the imposition of the death penalty by stoning for anyone violating the Sabbath, and the laws of tzitzit.

Korach Numbers 16:1 - 18:32

In this sidra, Moses confronts a series of interrelated rebellions. Korah, a

Levite, and a group of Reubenites along with two-hundred-fifty other prominent Israelites voice their discontent at being excluded from the religious leadership of the people. They express their resentment toward Aaron, the High Priest, and accuse Moses of unfulfilled promises.

God causes the earth to open; Korah, his two ringleaders and their families descend into the abyss. A fire consumes the two-hundred-fifty Israelites who made common cause with Korah. The people react angrily against Moses, blaming him for the deaths of so many men of renown. As punishment for holding Moses responsible for these deaths, a plague breaks out killing 14,700 before Aaron can perform rites and offer prayers of intervention.

A final vindication of Aaron's claim to the priesthood occurs when the princes of all the tribes are asked to deposit their staffs before the ark in the Sanctuary. The following morning Aaron's rod alone has produced blossoms, buds and almonds. Aaron's staff was then preserved beside the ark as a sign for generations to come.

With the priests' and the Levites' positions confirmed, the Torah now stipulates which sacrifices were to be designated for the maintenance of the priests, and allocates a tithe on all produce for the Levites. These benefits are in compensation for the priests and the Levites not receiving any real property in the apportionment of the Land of Israel among the tribes.

Chukat Numbers 19:1 - 22:1

The overwhelming emphasis on life that is basic to Judaism can be discerned in the ritual that begins this week's parasha: the use of ashes from a slaughtered red heifer for purification of anyone who has come into contact with the dead.

The thirty-eight years of additional wandering in the wilderness (as a punishment for the lack of resolve to conquer Canaan) are passed over with little detail. Miriam dies in the fortieth year of the journey, and shortly thereafter following Moses' impatience when he strikes a rock to bring forth water from it rather than speaking to it, Aaron dies as well.

The Israelites now prepare to conquer the land in earnest. Unable to enter directly from the west, they journey

south of Edom to avoid conflict with Esau's descendents; they will enter the land from the east. They successfully repulse the attack from the king of Arad. But spiritual weariness and the recurrent complaint about lack of food and water result in divine punishment: fiery serpents whose stings are lethal. Moses fashions a brass serpent that is carried throughout the camp suspended from a pole; whoever looks upon it will recover from the snake bites.

The Israelites journey northward, conquering Emor and Bashan. The Israelites are now in possession of all territory east of the Jordan River from the Arnon to Mount Hermon. They encamp on the east bank of the Jordan, opposite the Moabite town of Jericho.

Balak Numbers 22:2 - 25:9

In the wake of the Israelite victories over several of the nations/city states on the eastern side of the Jordan River, Balak, King of Moab, is justifiably panicked about the prospect of military confrontation. Knowing he cannot defeat Israel on the battlefield, he hires Balaam, a sorcerer, to curse the Israelites.

On three successive occasions, from different sites overlooking the Israelite encampment, Balaam, at God's behest, praises and blesses the nation. Furious at this betrayal, Balak dismisses Balaam, but not before Balaam delivers a prophecy in which he foretells the defeat of Moab and others at the hands of Israel.

At the next campsite, Shittim, a large number of the Israelite men have sexual liaisons with Moabite and Midianite women and participate in the worship of Baal-Pe'or. While efforts are under way to slay the ringleaders of this group, a plague breaks out in the camp.

In the midst of this chaotic situation, one Israelite man commits the brazen act of bringing a Midianite woman into his tent. Pinhas, son of Elazar, the High Priest, follows them and kills them, bringing an end to the plague in which 24,000 people died.

Pinchas
Numbers 25:10 - 30:1

As his reward for his zealotness, Pinhas is promised by God that his descendants would be in the possession of the High Priesthood for succeeding generations. God also extends to Pinhas his special covenant of peace.

In preparation for the conquest of

Canaan, Moses and Elazar are commanded to take a census of the Israelites to ascertain the number of males above the age of twenty eligible for military service. This census will also provide the basis for the division of the land among the tribes based upon their population. The total is slightly more than 600,000.

Since the apportionment of the land and all future inheritances are restricted to male family members, the case of the late Tzelofchad's five daughters requires special adjudication. The matter is submitted to God by Moses, who is then informed that daughters may inherit if there are no sons.

God discloses to Moses that his end is near. Moses' immediate concern is for

the welfare of the people and he asks that a successor with certain qualities be appointed. Moses is directed to present Joshua to the nation.

The sidra concludes with a comprehensive description of all public sacrifices offered daily, weekly and on holidays.




