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Cantor's Notes

Let me begin by saying that I am appalled at myself for not knowing until two weeks ago that our beloved country of Israel was under savage attack. I do not often watch the world news, mainly because I am at work when it comes on, but I will also add that I do not watch it because it is too depressing!

Last week, in our parasha, Lech L'cha, we attempted to understand, like many sages before us, why Gd. chose Avraham. I found a new take on that question in this month's Reform Judaism magazine. Rabbi Edwin Goldberg, suggested that Avraham Avinu was chosen because he asked the right question, "Who is there, and does anyone care?"

Rabbi Goldberg suggests that Avraham Avinu was referring to the injustices he was seeing around him. I think that applies to what is happening in Israel, not only today, but throughout the ages.

In my readings, I found on Chabad's website, a list of 7 things we can do outside Eretz Yisrael to help.

1. Take up a "call to arms." For those who want, don tefillin, whose spiritual potency is foretold in the Talmud to help instill fear and deterrence in the enemy.
2. Share the Power of Light. Lighting Shabbat and holiday candles ushers light and peace into the home and the world.
3. Check Your (Spiritual) Security System. The mezuzah is called the "guard" of the Jewish home and the guardian of the Jewish people throughout the ages.
4. Pray. The power of prayer, especially when we pray as a people, increases the chances for our prayers to reach the gates of heaven and plead with the Almighty to make things better.
5. Be Financially Supportive. Give charity! The protective strength of charity is considered to be particularly strong.

When providing Oneg, please keep the following guidelines in mind:

- An inexpensive, small centerpiece would be appreciated. Vases will be provided for flowers.
- Oneg suggestions include a sheet cake or two dozen cookies as well as fruit, nuts, trail mix or vegetables.
- Juice and wine will be provided.
- Paper products and silverware will be provided.
- Set up should be done before Services, but, if necessary, can be done quietly during Services.
- Clean up includes emptying trash cans, sweeping and mopping floors, washing and putting away all items used, and wiping down countertops.

Kosher Fusion by Shuli



As you know we don't have a Thanksgiving holiday in Israel and turkey is not one of the proteins I grew up on. I learned how to cook turkey after coming to America and joining Jack's family, now they ask me to cook the turkey exclusively (not bragging!). I know everybody has their own way to cook the turkey and I also know all of us will have a bunch of leftover turkey the next day or days.

Here is a great recipe you can use roasted, smoked or fried turkey leftovers and once again it will bring the family to the table. I combined this with a popular Israeli breakfast/brunch dish called "Shakshuka". Shakshuka was brought to Israel by the North African Jews and now almost every restaurant in Israel serves this dish and you will find it in any household for breakfast or dinner. The basic dish made with eggs pouched in tomato sauce and there are million variations of vegetarian and non-vegetarian Shakshukas.

Turkey Shakshuka:

- ¼ cup oil (it's a lot but we need it)
- 8 ripe roma tomatoes, diced large
- 8 cloves of garlic, minced
- 1 green bell pepper, diced
- 1 Tbsp sweet paprika
- ½ tsp spicy paprika (optional)
- Salt & black pepper
- 2 cups diced turkey leftovers (dark or white meat, no skin)
- 6 eggs
- Red pepper flakes to sprinkle on top (optional)
- Parsley to sprinkle on top (optional)

Use a large heavy iron skillet and

heat the oil in it.
 Add bell pepper and garlic and cook for a minute. (do not burn the garlic)
 Add tomatoes and salt, and when they start to bubble, lower the heat and cook until the tomatoes are soft.
 Add turkey, black pepper and paprika, mix well. Cook until turkey is just heated through.
 Spread everything in one layer in the skillet, make 6 little wells and break the eggs one by one into each well. Cook for few minutes until eggs are cooked to your liking. Sprinkle red pepper flakes or parsley.
 Serve with crusty bread or fresh challah.

Weekly Parshas

Cheyi Sarah Genesis 23:1 - 25:18

Sarah dies at the age of one hundred twenty-seven. Abraham purchases the Cave of Machpelah as a burial site for her, courteously refusing the offer of the Hittite population to provide a fitting-resting place as a gift.

Abraham sends a trusted servant to the city of Haran with the purpose of finding a wife for Isaac. The servant encounters a considerate, compassionate girl at the city's well. She is Rebecca, granddaughter of Nahor, Abraham's brother. Betuel, Rebecca's father and Laban, Rebecca's brother, welcome the servant hospitably. He tells them of his mission and presents them with many gifts. They consent to the marriage of Rebecca to Isaac.

We are informed of the marriage of Abraham to Ketura, with whom he had many sons and through whom he became the father to many Arab tribes. To make it perfectly clear that Isaac is Abraham's only heir, Abraham sends these sons away laden with gifts, leaving Isaac as sole possessor of his property and heritage.

Abraham dies at the age of one hundred seventy-five; Isaac and Ishmael bury him in the Cave of Machpelah.

Toldot Genesis 25:19 - 28:9

Returning one day from the hunt, a famished Esau traded his birthright (status as a firstborn) to Jacob for a bowl of lentil stew.

Isaac and Rebecca seek relief from famine in Gerar. Isaac presents Rebecca as his sister, just as Abraham had done with Sarah on two previous occasions. This time, however, the truth about their relationship does not lead to expulsion. They are allowed to remain in Gerar and Isaac becomes quite wealthy. His success arouses the enmity of the locals, and their king, Avimelech, requests that they depart.

Esau brings grief to his parents by marrying two Hittite women.

Years later Isaac requests that

Esau prepare a special meal for him after which he will confirm his older son's position as first born. Rebecca overhears her husband's conversation, and conspires to disguise Jacob as his older brother. While Isaac has some uncertainty as to whom he is blessing, the ruse works because Isaac has become blind in his old age. Jacob receives a blessing for inheriting a fertile land and ruling over nations.

When Esau returns, the plot is revealed. An enraged Esau vows to kill his brother upon their father's death. Rebecca and Isaac encourage Jacob to leave home and to go to Haran to live with Rebecca's brother, Laban.

In an effort to appease his parents for marrying Hittite women, Esau also married a daughter of Ishmael.

Vayetzei Genesis 28:10 - 32:3

On route to his uncle's home in Haran, Jacob encamps in the open air near the city of Luz. That night he has a vision of angels ascending and descending a ladder from heaven. God appears to him and promises protection to Jacob, and the land to his descendants. In the morning Jacob erects a stele on the site, renames the place Beth El, and vows that if he returns home unharmed he will dedicate a tenth of his possessions to God.

On the outskirts of Haran, Jacob encounters his cousin Rachel, a shepherdess, at the local well. He is so taken with her that he single-handedly removes the stone covering the well and waters her flock. Jacob is welcomed cordially into his uncle Laban's household, and he agrees to work for seven years as a shepherd in order to gain his cousin Rachel's hand in marriage. Laban deceives him and he is wedded to Leah, Rachel's older sister. Jacob must now work an additional seven years to marry Rachel.

During the years in Haran, Leah and Rachel - and their handmaidens, Bilhah and Zilpah - bear Jacob eleven sons and one daughter. (Benjamin, the 12th son, will be born near Bethlehem.)

Jacob works an additional six

years for Laban in exchange for all the streaked and spotted animals born into the flock. Without any detriment to Laban's pure black and white animals, Jacob's flock becomes exceedingly numerous, arousing envy and hostility in Laban and his sons. Jacob decides that it is time to return home with his family and flock. He departs while Laban is away; Laban overtakes him and they have a brief confrontation before concluding a covenant of peace with each other. The journey home is resumed.

Vayishlach Genesis 32:4 - 36:43

Jacob prepares for the worst as he anticipates having to confront his brother Esau upon his return home. He divides his household into two groups so that if Esau and his troops set upon one, the other might escape. He also sends a succession of valuable gifts to Esau in the hope of appeasing him.

The night before their "reunion" Jacob wrestles with a man (actually an angel) and defeats him. This stranger blesses him with a new name, Israel, the meaning of which is "he who prevails with God".

Jacob's fears regarding his brother turn out to be unfounded. Esau embraces him with affection and offers to escort Jacob's family. Jacob declines the offer; Esau returns to Seir, and Jacob eventually settles in Shechem, a town named by its chieftain, Hamor, in honor of his son.

Jacob's only daughter, Dinah is seduced by Shechem. The only circumstance under which Dinah's brothers will allow them to marry is if

all the Shechemite men undergo circumcision. Surprisingly, they agree. While they are recuperating, Simeon and Levi, Dinah's brothers, slay them all to avenge their sister's dishonor.

Jacob departs Shechem, journeying to Beth El, the site of his vision of the heavenly staircase. God's promise to him is reiterated and his name Israel is re-confirmed. Rachel dies near the city of Bethlehem while giving birth to Benjamin. Jacob reunites with his father, Isaac. Isaac dies at the age of 180, and is buried by his two sons in the Cave of Machpelah.

The sidra ends with a genealogical listing of the descendants of Esau.

Consider in part also an Israel-based charity.

6. Nurture Your Faith. It has kept us going for thousands of years. Amid all crises, the faith and knowledge that G-d is with us and protects us.
7. Join the Unity Torah Scroll. The Torah is the common denominator that unites all Jewish people. Special Torah scrolls are being written in Israel, in which every single Jewish person may purchase a letter to become part of the Torah and unite together. Besides for fulfilling (at least in part) the Biblical commandment to write a Torah scroll, having a letter in these scrolls connects you and Jewish people all over the globe, in Israel and the diaspora, into one Torah-created unified entity. We can purchase letters for yourself and your family members, and encourage others to do the same.

Rabbi Goldberg summarizes his article with this thought: "And hence the call of Abraham becomes the call to Abraham. The world, sadly, is still burning. Does anyone care?" And I say, Eretz Yisrael is under siege. "Does anyone care?" Will the call to Abraham Avinu be our call to fight the injustice that is going on in our time?
